

The cloud of objects that organizes itself throughout the spaces of Kunsthalle Basel as part of the 18th edition of the Regionale was selected by guest curator Andreas Angelidakis from an open call and features artists from or affiliated with Basel and the tri-national region around it. What follows is an imaginative narrative by Angelidakis to accompany his exhibition and scenography, entitled OOO Object Oriented Ontology:

In their very organization, the exhibition's artworks incite ideas about being and becoming. The forty-six artists in this exhibition come from different generations and use an array of distinct mediums; their artworks have travelled from the dimension of ideas to the space that you, as a visitor, now share with them. With them they carry thoughts about how to exist in the world, and how the world changes us from one type of entity to another. They challenge the usual understanding of "we," suggesting that "we" means not only us humans, but also animals and inanimate objects, all equals. Ontology is the study of being, and object-oriented ontology is the philosophy attempting to understand our being beyond a human perspective. The world of OOO Object Oriented Ontology is a place where clear separations no longer exist, where knowing and not knowing, understanding and not understanding, liking and not liking are no longer binary. Just as in the classical Greek definition of philosophy, where $\Sigma o \varphi i \alpha$ (wisdom) is something you can only travel towards, but never fully arrive at, the works in OOO Object Oriented Ontology summon us with their allure, without ever being fully decipherable. We, the visitors, are here to watch while these artworks reflect on each other, collide, and converse. They are objects and we are subjects, but perhaps after leaving the exhibition we will be objects, too; we will have somehow become part of the cloud permeating these rooms, and these expanded object relationships will continue to evolve in our minds.

The exhibition is articulated through the spatial sequence in this building; attempting to extend this sequence, thresholds and passages have been added. All of these are based on the notion that the moment we move from one space to another, we move from one condition, from one state of being to another, and then yet another. Most of the works in the exhibition are representations of beings, and by "beings" I mean humans, but also cats and frogs and dogs and maybe even fireplaces and ovens and machines. Arguably, the feelings we have while encountering an entity are entities, too. These "object feelings' have spatial properties and they are housed in our psyche. Évery visitor will have different feelings about, and in, this exhibition, every recollection will be an entity, every memory a description of this exhibition.

One of the descriptions could start like this: a room is divided by a see-through wall. Two figures stand on each side of the wall, facing each other through a doorway. The figures seem to be humans from another dimension, caught in a conversation we cannot hear, except in our imagination. Around them, various artworks host other beings, in various states of transformation. This space appears to be an entrance of some kind, or a sorting area. I will call this first room **Entering**.

The next room appears to be domestic: a fireplace, candles, windows. Is this where the creatures seen in the first room live? Will they come back here at night, when the exhibition is closed? We could call this room **Home**, but only if we accept that a home is an entity independent from humans, that a room can be "home" even if the only thing that lives there is the idea of a home.

The space after **Home** is dark, and appears to be accommodating some kind of experiment. Perhaps this is a place where entities will attempt to develop multiple identities. A visitor might leave this room changed, as if having stepped out of a laboratory, through a brief moment in experimental time. Is time an object, too? Can you hold on to time? And does time take place when you are not there to experience its passing?

Leaving the room that we now call Laboratory, I am in a corridor outside a room, which I cannot yet see. A sound is present, but the source is invisible. I am neither inside nor outside this room. How can I be both inside and outside the same space? According to object-oriented ontology, objects do not have to be understood in order to exist, and so this corridor that is

inside and outside a room, is perhaps a different type of entity that does not have a name. But we will call this place **Passage**, just so that we can remember where we have been.

Through Passage, you or I enter a large room of cages and shadows, full of paintings of figures and their shadow-selves, objects, drawings, collages, more transitions and thresholds to go through. Could this be the last room on this itinerary? The entities living inside the works seem still to be busy in their becoming; their journey has not ended. They are present inside and outside of our understanding. Perhaps they are not objects at all: perhaps this is a site for shadows that project their own objects onto our plane of consciousness. This space makes me think of a theory by object-oriented ontology philosopher Quentin Meillassoux: A contradictory entity cannot possibly exist, because if it did, it would contradict its own existence. I am not sure if I remember this correctly, so I will call this room **Shadow**, because who would ever ask you to describe a shadow precisely?

Now I am in a room that feels familiar, it must be the space next to Passage. The place I experienced without entering. Is a room the same every time we enter it? If we were to enter a room over and over again, would the room feel the same every time? And even if it stayed the same, would it not be us that have changed, because one more experience of entering the room would have been added to our being? Let's call this space the room without a name, or as they often say in the field of contemporary art, Untitled.

I decide to leave, and again I find myself passing through spaces that I already have passed through. I know that these spaces are no longer the same, because it is me who is no longer the same. I might be closer to another version of me, but the closer I get to the next me, I will always see yet another version of myself, waiting patiently in the distance.

Andreas Angelidakis is an architect, artist, and curator, born 1968 in Athens; he lives and works in Athens and Oslo.

OOO Object Oriented Ontology is part of Regionale 18 and curated by Andreas Angelidakis.

Regionale brings together eighteen institutions from three countries (France, Germany, Switzerland) presenting artistic positions from the region of Basel and the tri-national area (Alsace, Northwestern Switzerland, South Baden).
